FLOOD OF '37

The flood of 1937 was a devastating period for the Ohio Valley to include many residents of Southern Illinois. The flood took place in late January and February 1937 with damage stretching from Pittsburgh to Cairo, Illinois. One million people were left homeless, with 385 dead and property losses reaching \$500 million (over \$8 billion in current dollars). Federal and state resources were strained to aid recovery, as the disaster occurred during the depths of the Great Depression and Dust Bowl of the 1930's. Flood waters in parts of Southern Illinois reached over 30 miles inland and Harrisburg was nearly destroyed. Most of Maunie was under water and the village of Shawneetown was completely inundated, forcing the residents to move to a tent city on the outskirts. Property damages in Southern Illinois amounted to more than \$75 million (over \$1 billion today). Over three hundred bridges were smashed, six schools were ruined, and twelve hundred homes submerged. Flood waters were recorded at 65.4 feet. Damage in Old Shawneetown was so cataclysmic the town relocated three miles inland to higher ground away from the river. Carmi was one of several staging areas for relief efforts.

The Library of Congress has a collection of photographs of the period showing the impact the floods had on the people and the region (www.loc.gov/pictures/collection/coll/item/2004678082/). The following two pictures are from that collection and were taken on Main Cross in Carmi and depict truckloads of corn sent as a gift from the farmers of Livingston County, Illinois to southeastern Illinois flood counties. The Robinson-Stewart house can be seen in the background on the one photo, and the courthouse and part of the "castle" on the other. \bowtie

200 TREES TO BE SOLD TO COMMEMORATE CARMI'S BICENTENNIAL Carmi Chamber of Commerce

To commemorate Carmi's 200th birthday, the Carmi Bicentennial Committee has approved the sale of 200 specially designated Bicentennial Trees. The trees, which will consist of white oak, bald cypress, hackberry, red bud, tulip poplar, and sugar maple, are all native to the Carmi area. They will come in five gallon containers and will be between four and seven feet tall. Anyone may purchase the trees, and they may be planted anywhere – residential areas, churches, schools, businesses, and public areas. The trees will be ordered from a nursery this winter, and will arrive ready to be planted in the fall of 2015. The Bicentennial Committee will arrange for the trees to be planted if buyers would rather not do the planting themselves. Orders will be taken beginning in October of 2014, and all orders must be pre-paid. "Final details are still being worked out, but complete ordering information will be available soon," noted Holly Healy, committee member.
