We will also recognize each of these men during the program.

PIONEER DAYS 2015

Weather can be rather fickle and after almost six weeks of zero to little precipitation, mother nature decided to give White County and the surrounding areas a drink of water on September 29—so much water that we had to cancel day one of "Pioneer Days." Unfortunately, this prevented Carmi and Grayville 5th graders from experiencing this annual event sponsored by the WCHS. School, bus and volunteer schedules precluded us from establishing a make-up day.

However, day two turned out to be one of the nicest days one could have asked for and Norris City and Enfield 5th graders got to experience what life was like during the late 1800's and early 1900's. With the help of more than 20 volunteers, including many members of the White County Retired Teachers Association, students were shown how to make butter, wash and dry clothes; introduced to early 20th century farm life to include animals that might have been present on some farms; and the drying and grinding of corn to make flour and meal. They were given a class in the one room school house and introduced to games students would have played long before the advent of computers and related electronics. They were also shown what life would have been like living in a two room cabin without running water, and given a history lesson and tour of Carmi's "Old Graveyard". 
